From the Rabbi

We are on a journey during this season that began over the summer, through the Hebrew month of Elul, Rosh Hashanah, the ten days of teshuvah and Yom Kippur, culminating on Sukkot Simchat Torah. All of these holidays are connected.

Rabbi Alan Lew wrote a book called, *This is Real and You are Completely Unprepared* about the days of awe as a journey of transformation, self-discovery, spiritual discipline, self-forgiveness, and spiritual evolution. He taught that Tisha B'Av is not about only the walls of the ancient Temple in Jerusalem that came crashing down nearly 2000 years ago, but also the crashing of the walls that we build around ourselves, to protect ourselves from what we fear or the reality of our lives. Tisha B'av is about exile from the Divine. We may become estranged for multiple reasons – sins, mistakes, struggles, loss, illness, being too hard on ourselves, distractions, forgetting our real purpose in this life. *Teshuvah* – repentance, or more literally, turning, brings us closer to the Divine presence within us and surrounding us.

The walls have crumbled and we examine our relationships and patterns during the month of Elul. On Rosh Hashanah, we are reminded that rebirth is always possible. On Yom Kippur we face our mortality, the stark reality of it all. The Books of Life and Death are open. Our liturgy is calling us to wake up

and live with meaning and with purpose. We write ourselves into the book of life by living life more fully.

By the time we reach Sukkot, also called *zman simchateinu*/the season of our rejoicing, we are filled with joy, because we are fully here. The walls that came crashing down on Tisha B'Av are like the impermanent walls of the sukkah – fluid enough that we can be more aware of God's presence in our lives, just as we may be when we dwell in a sukkah, and smell the fall and the harvest and look up at the stars. On Simchat Torah we grasp our Tree of Life, our Torah, which has nourished our people for thousands of years, and we dance.

This journey of self-transformation does not happen in isolation, but in the context of community. We are all in this together.

Rebirth. Renewal. Another chance. For all of us. I hope you can join us along the way, including for an exciting Harvest to Table Sukkot Shabbat Dinner with our Green Team, our all-generation Simchat Torah celebration when we dance and unroll a scroll, and so much more.

From the President

At some point, we have all had to explain the High Holidays to our non-Jewish friends and families.

Describing the facts is pretty straightforward. On Rosh Hashana we celebrate the New Year. On Yom Kippur we fast and atone for our sins and prepare to have a better year. On Sukkot, we celebrate nature and the harvest, and on Simchat Torah we celebrate the end of the Torah-reading cycle and the beginning of the new one. Three of them are happy, one not so much.

What is almost impossible to describe, however, are the many feelings we all experience over the three weeks that encompass the holiest time of the year. Our feelings are unique - no two people experience the Holidays the same way.

For some, the Rosh Hashana service brings back memories of going to Temple with our parents and if we are very lucky, grandparents. It is impossible to hear the piercing wail of the Shofar and not feel awakened. Some of us find that Taschlich's ritual casting away of our sins at Dane Street Beach helps ground us. Others find the experience of fasting and asking for forgiveness, and introspection on Yom Kippur to be

especially impactful. Many of us find Yizkor to be a powerful way to honor the memories of loved ones. Eating in the Sukkah is something everyone remembers from our youth and singing and dancing with the Torah at Simchat Torah is a joyous culmination of this season.

What I find most interesting is that although the services, traditions, and rituals don't change much from year-to-year, my experience is always different. I never know when I am going to read or hear something new that makes me pause and consider something for the first time. It's deeply personal and hard to describe but it happens differently each year. As I prepare to observe our High Holidays, I have a sense of anticipation of what I am going to experience for the first time this year.

I want to thank the Ritual Committee, Sisterhood, Seating Committee, Rabbi Adler, Cantor Grossman, Deb Schutzman, Erin Lipkowitz, Bernie Der, Deb Willwerth and Ritual Committee, Greeters, Board of Directors, and countless others for their hard work to enable the rest of us to experience the most special time of year.
